To the Students of Merced College:





It was a fitting finish to the festivities.










Jim Whitehouse (72) leads the way as Quarterback Kitt Kahl (11) sweeps left end against Imperial Valley.

throws (134), intercepted the most passes (72), and set an assist mark of 171.


The most notable individual records set were John Keely's 34 points in one game, Bob Shadric's 28 rebounds against the Fresno State Frosh, and Juan Escamillo's 171 assists.

Several team standards were also shattered. The most outstanding were best record (18-11), best scoring average (81.2) and best free throw percentage (68.7%).

Is a CCICA title in the near future for the Blue Devils? Coach Reid thinks it's quite possible. "Nearly all of this year's squad will be back next season, and with a couple of the top high schhool seniors in the area we could very well take the championship." championship."




Although hampered by a lack of court facilities, the Merced College tennis team finished its first year by winning over a third of the individual matches during league competition.




